Therapeutic Goal Unlocked

We have an 11-year-old client who has been diagnosed with autistic spectrum disorder and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder. When he started with us, his vocalization was mostly noises, and he would often run around in his session. Through equine-facilitated psychotherapy, he has been able to lower his arousal and achieve the ability to calmly and quietly ride a horse for up to 40 minutes. He is beginning to ride independently and his verbalization has increased. Now he is able to have short conversations and he addresses the staff by name. He is more easily redirected and stays on task for longer periods of time. His therapist commented after the last session, "Just because someone's software doesn't work like everyone else's doesn't mean they can't learn, change and grow."

Projects

- **Indoor Arena:** Remove dirt, treat base layer with lime, add sand and magnesium sulfate, and repaint walls.
